Reading for meaning



The latest Progress in International Reading Literacy Study (PIRLS) has revealed that a staggering 81% of Grade 4 learners in SA are unable to read for meaning. The study was conducted on over a million children. It means roughly eight out of 10 children need help locating and retrieving explicitly stated information in simple and easy text. This is an alarming state of affairs and an indictment of our education system. We have to harness and nurture our children to improve literacy and numeracy. This is not only for the teacher to address reading, but parents also need to get involved and collaborate so we can alter the future of our children.

•81% of South African children not able to read with understanding at age level 10 years – grade 4 (2021 PIRLS

(Progress in International Reading Literacy Study) – decline of 3% after previous study conducted in 2016 versus SONA 2019 pronouncement that every 10-year-old must be able read for meaning by 2030.

What exactly does it mean to "read for meaning"? Reading for meaning means leaners focus on discussing and understanding what they are reading, not just pronouncing the words correctly. Parents can help children "read for meaning" by asking two main types of questions – literal and inferential. About literal questions:



Inferential questions: Inferential questions focus on the ability to understand the hidden concepts and the unstated relationship between the lines in a text and in the visuals. I request that



every parent encourages his/her child to read at home. Read notice boards, advertisements, signs, flyers, pamphlets, magazines and newspapers. Ask your child what they read. Ask literal questions and inferential questions.

Our Grade 4 students donned their thinking caps and embarked on preparations for the highly anticipated Conquesta English Olympiad. This Olympiad, which takes place on the 8 August, is a prestigious event that provides our learners with an opportunity to showcase their knowledge of English language structures and conventions. It will also test our learners comprehension skills, in other words, reading for understanding.

These exams play an important role in evaluating our learners' performance with their peers across the country and have the added benefit of improving our learners' confidence. To excel in the Olympiad, our learners must have a solid understanding of grammar rules and language mechanics. To make sure that our Grade 4s are ready for the big day they will practise, practise and practise!

Today our learners learnt how to fill in an Olympiad answer sheet and worked through a full paper of 35 questions. They did incredibly well! They also had a lot of fun! It was so heart-warming to see our learners giving of their best. One thing we know for sure is that CityKidz never ever shy away from a good challenge. Keep it up CityKidz! Ms Finlay

Spelling Bee Competition

A spelling bee also helps children gain the confidence they need to speak in public and accept their mistakes in a public forum.

The teams have been chosen and 50 children will participate from Grade 4-7. Learners will be given support and encouragement during the competition as they compete in the hall in front of their classmates. This can be nerve wracking but a child's confidence level is usually boosted after participating in these competitions.

Spelling lists have been copied and issued to the participants.

Please encourage your child to spend time learning the words. Many spelling bee words have been included in this years' newsletters. Children can learn the words on the playground, while queuing for lunch, waiting for transport, sitting at the pick up zone, etc!

All children entering will receive a participation certificate. Even if your child does not win, it's important to remember that taking part in a spelling bee competition can result in a range of benefits ranging from higher confidence from getting the applause their hard work deserves. The overall winner will receive the Spelling Bee Trophy at prizegiving.



The past weeks have been busy , yet filled with fun activities that challenge the children holistically .


It has been a wonderful, rewarding journey watching our little learners grow and excel inside and outside of our classrooms.

In today's world, environmental conservation has become a pressing concern. It is crucial to educate young minds about sustainable practices and instil a sense of responsibility

towards our planet. Recognising the significance of this issue, CityKidz has initiated a recycling project and dedicated recycling bins have been placed throughout the school. The aim of this recycling project is to reduce waste and in-spire behaviour change at our school.

We are excited that our Grade 7 learners took the opportunity to integrate this initiative with their playground Prefect duties. Of their own accord they are now helping our learners sort lunchtime waste into the recycling bins. Well done Grade 7s! With continued efforts like these, we can help pave the way for a greener and more sustainable future.

More about recycling ...

What do those number symbols on plastic really mean? Interestingly, the number symbols that you see inside triangles on plastic bottles and containers were not meant to help us identify which ones to recycle. This number system was started by the Society of Plastics Industry (SPI) to simply identify the plastic resin content. Maybe that's why the numbers are so hard to see!

It gets complicated because every local recycling facility collects different types of plastics and you need to contact your recycler to know which plastics get collected. Bottom-line, there are seven types of plastics. In general, most recyclers accept plastics #1 and #2. Plastics #3 to #6 are more difficult to recycle and some recycling centres do not process them. Plastic #7 is even more difficult to recycle and is almost always excluded from recycling.
