Book Donation from the AFMVC church

The CityKidz family would like to extend its heartfelt gratitude for the wonderful books donated by Nigel, who does charity work, from the AFMVC church. The books ranged from delightful children's stories to fun filled encyclopaedias. It was wonderful to see the learners eagerly completing their class tasks in order to get an opportunity to read the new books in the library! As a social initiative, the school welcomes such lovely gestures. These books will go a long way into instilling a love for reading in our learners. As is well known our children in South Africa did not perform very well in the Progress in International Reading Literacy Study (PIRLS), which is an organisation aimed at assessing reading comprehension and monitoring trends and indicators of growth in reading literacy at five-year intervals. The last assessment took place in 2021 and involved 57 countries of which South Africa came in last. It was reported that our Grade 4 learners cannot read for meaning. CityKidz is determined to change that status quo one learner at a time. Receiving such a huge donation of books provides our learners with a variety of genres to choose from and sparks an interest in different subjects. Through reading books children gain valuable knowledge, expand their vocabulary, and strengthen their brains as science has proven. More than that, they can scale the Great Walls of China, meet prominent figures in History, conquer villains and become heroes and heroines, all without leaving their seats. Books unlock a world of wonder and allow children to explore the world. Thank you, Nigel, for this generous gift. It certainly has inspired our learners to keep on reading!






