If you want your children to be intelligent, read them fairy tales. If you want them to be more intelligent, read them more fairy tales." (Albert Einstein)

Literacy is more important than ever it was, in this world of text and email, a world of written information. We need to read and write, we need global citizens who can read comfortably, comprehend what they are reading, understand nuance, and make themselves understood.

The simplest way to make sure that we raise literate children is to teach them to read, and to show them that reading is a pleasurable activity. And that means, at its simplest, finding books that they enjoy, giving them access to those books, and letting them read them. (Neil Gaiman - children's author)

Reading for Fun

Does reading for pleasure increase the rate of children's learning? Bright children tend to read for pleasure more than their less skilled peers. A recent British study indicates that reading for pleasure improves not just literacy but mathematics ability too:

The British Cohort Study, which follows the lives of 17 000 people born in a single week in 1970 in England, Scotland and Wales, was used.

Children from the same social backgrounds were tested at ages 5 and 10. It was discovered that those who frequently read books at age 10 and more than once a week at age 16, had higher test results than those who read less.

Reading for pleasure was linked to greater intellectual progress, both in spelling, vocabulary and mathematics.

Reading introduces young people to new words, so the link between reading for pleasure and vocabulary development is expected.

But the link between reading for fun and progress in mathematics may be more surprising. Reading also introduces young people to new ideas. It helps them understand and absorb new information and concepts at school.

Independent reading may promote a more self-sufficient approach to learning.

Young people today read less in their spare time than previous generations. Research suggests that this may negatively affect their intellectual development.

It is very important for schools and libraries to provide access to a wide range of books and help young people discover authors they will enjoy.

In order to satisfy the demand for new reading material. It is costly to buy new books.

Johannesburg has a number of public libraries which are either free to join or cost a nominal R30 per year.

Parents, explore the opportunities in your areas, especially with winter holidays coming up. An outing to a library is a fun, inexpensive exercise and can provide hours of reading pleasure for all children.

Secondhand bookshops can also satisfy the demand for new reading material and at an affordable rate.

In conclusion : Libraries are about freedom. Freedom to read, freedom of ideas, freedom of communication. They are about education (which is not a process that finishes the day we leave school or university), about entertainment, about making safe spaces, and about access to information.

Foundation Phase

Mathematics in Foundation Phase made as easy as 1, 2, 3!

Teachers in the Foundation Phase have been hard at work demystifying that Mathematics is hard. Mathematics has been perceived as the most challenging subject to learn. You are told that it is supposed to be hard and with that comes fear, self doubt and low self esteem. Teachers strive to remove the crippling fear that is synonymous with learning Mathematics. There is no such thing as a Maths person. It is mostly perception; all it takes is practice, practice and practice! Mathematics involves using plenty of multi step processes to solve problems, and mastering the use of such processes over a variety of problems takes a lot of practice.

Mathematics is cumulative. Prerequisite skills and knowledge form the foundation of many concepts to be learnt. Many learners find Mathematics difficult because they memorize their way through the material without real understanding of how to arrive at a solution. Instilling a love for numbers and problem solving has been the main focus in all lessons.

Ways we found to make learning Maths fun;

- playing games and using manipulatives.
- creating and telling Maths stories.
- reading mini Maths stories.
- holding Maths fun days such as Fraction Frenzy, Sock Symmetry and watch out for Sharing is Caring day.
- integrating Maths with visual and performing arts through dance and crafts.
- Model making such construction and modelling of 3D structures.



Grade 1 Lego Activities

Legos can support active learning in multiple ways. By encouraging students to engage with each other and reflect on the experiences. The learners can also experiment with building different types of structures. Legos are also excellent for building the learners fine motor skills as they develop grasp along with intrinsic hand strength, having to push them together and then pull them apart. Legos can also improve hand eye coordination. The Grade 1s had so much fun with the Lego pieces.



Grade 2 Animals that carry their homes.

In a captivating lesson on animal habitats, learner's at CityKidz are discovering the incredible world of creatures that carry their homes on their backs. From snails and hermit crabs to turtles and tortoises, these remarkable animals have evolved unique adaptations that allow them to carry their shelter wherever they go.

Under the guidance of their enthusiastic grade 2 teacher, the learner's have been engrossed in learning about various animal habitats and the extraordinary ways in which creatures have adapted to their environments. The focus of their recent lessons has been on animals that literally wear their homes, providing them with safety, protection, and a sense of belonging.

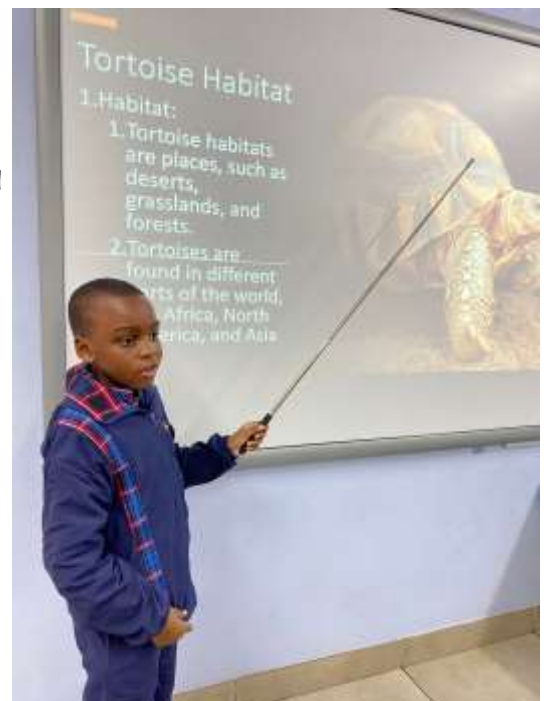
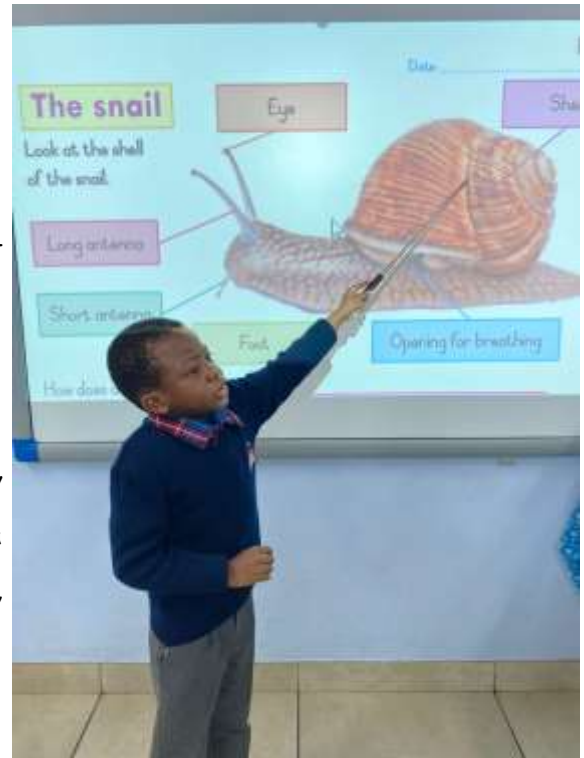
One of the most captivating examples shared during the lesson was the snail. These slow-moving mollusks carry their shells, meticulously crafted from calcium carbonate, on their backs. The shell serves as a protective covering, shielding them from predators and providing a cozy dwelling even on the move. The learner's were fascinated by the snail's ability to withdraw into its shell when feeling threatened, offering a perfect demonstration of adaptability in action.

Another creature that captured the students' imaginations was the hermit crab. With a soft abdomen vulnerable to attack, hermit crabs seek empty seashells to use as portable homes. As they grow, these resourceful crustaceans must find larger shells to accommodate their expanding bodies. The students were intrigued by the idea of a creature continually searching for a "new home," much like humans who move to larger residences as their families grow.

Tortoise were also a highlight of the lesson, as they are known for their sturdy protective shells. Students were amazed to learn that a tortoise shell is an integral part of its skeleton, fused to its spine and ribs. These unique shells provide a secure abode for these reptiles, offering shelter from both predators and harsh environmental conditions. The learner's got to see and touch a real tortoise in class, they eagerly examined the tortoise shell and other various animal shells, observing their intricate patterns and textures.

The lesson on animal habitats not only sparked excitement but also fostered a deeper understanding of the remarkable adaptations found in nature. By observing animals that carry their homes, the learner's gained valuable insights into the concepts of shelter, protection, and adaptation.

The dedicated teachers behind these engaging lessons shared their enthusiasm for the topic. "It's incredible to witness the learner's curiosity and enthusiasm as they explore the wonders of animal habitats," she said. "By examining these unique creatures and their adaptations, we hope to instill a sense of appreciation for the natural world
