

School Fees for 2026

Please refer to the adjustments below to school fees for the 2026 Academic Year starting on 01/01/2026.

Over recent years, we have worked diligently to keep school fees as affordable as possible, while continuing to provide high-quality education and maintain excellent facilities for learners. However, due to rising operational costs, inflationary pressures and the ongoing reduction of the Department of Education's subsidy, it has become necessary to increase the school fees by 8%. Trips and other additional items have also increased with inflation and service provider costs.

Additionally, we would like to inform you that although the Education Department currently provides subsidies that significantly help in keeping our fees manageable, they have because of their own budget limitations, cut our subsidies in the past 2 years by about 13% each year. CityKidz has for now managed to absorb these subsidy cuts without passing this loss of income onto the parents. Should these subsidies be reduced further, we may be required to review and adjust school fees in the accordingly to maintain our financial stability.

New Fee structure: The school fees for the 2026 academic year inclusive of trips are as follows:

- 1.New Registration Fee: R750.00 New parents only- Non-refundable
- 2. Annual School Administration Levy is a once off payment at the beginning of the year: inclusive of school photographs, learner support material, starter stationery package, Al and Robotics.
- 2.1 Grade RR to Grade 3 Annual School Administration Levy: INCLUSIVE OF Learner Support Material, additional workbooks, starter stationery pack, school photograph package and Al and Robotics R1 750.00. Once off payment at the beginning of the year
- 2.2 Grade 4 to Grade 7 Annual School Administration Levy INCLUSIVE OF Starter Stationery Pack, Learner Support Material, school photograph package and Al and Robotics R1 400.00 Once off payment at the beginning of the year.

3. MONTHLY FEES 11 MONTHS

- 3.1 Pre-School Grade RR to R Monthly Fees (11 months) R1 500.00 p/m
- 3.2 Primary School Grade 1 to 6 Monthly Fees (11 months) R1 800.00 p/m
- 3.3 Primary School Grade 7 Monthly Fees (11 months) R1 960.00 p/m
- 3.4 Aftercare R750-00 Monthly Fees (11 months)

This adjustment will enable us to maintain the standard of education and services that you expect from CityKidz Pre & Primary School.

We understand the financial strain that fee increases can cause and are committed to working with families who may face difficulties. 

We extend our heartfelt congratulations to Mr. Mgobhozi who has been selected for the 2025 cohort of the Teachers' Change Agents Network (Teachers CAN) Multiplier Programme. Out of more than 200 applicants, he will be joining a dynamic and passionate team of 20 young teachers across the country as a Lead Multiplier. In this programme, he will play a vital role in expanding its network, reach and shaping its impact in schools and the community.

This is a year-long rigorous programme with engagements/ workshops taking place during weekends and school holidays. Through immersive training, peer learning and collaboration, as well as building a network; the programme is aimed at leading



transformational change in the educational landscape and foster a supportive network for teachers. "Teachers CAN is an incubated initiative of the DG Murray Trust (DGMT). The Teachers' Change Agent Network (Teachers CAN) is a teacher-led network working towards realising the potential of all children in South Africa".

The DG Murray Trust prides itself on providing opportunities to build a thriving society by trying to bridge the inequality gap. Collaboratively, the two organisations' fundamental principles around education are to identify opportunities and set goals centred on three key factors. Notably, identifying and connecting imaginative leaders, innovation as well as inclusivity. Additionally, the Teachers CAN Multiplier Programme is an essential part of the Teachers CAN network which was launched in 2020. Establishing the programme was motivated by the fact that, upon entering the profession; young teachers are enthused to help learners soar and reach their full potential. However, challenging work environments and classrooms are often the microcosm of South Africa's broader social inequalities. This is what the programme aims to address through its change agents.



Afrikaans, the proverbial thorn in everyone's side. At CityKidz it is our first additional language and most of our parents say the same: 'My own Afrikaans is pretty bad. It's giving me grey hair, trying to help my child with a language I don't understand. How do I help?' If this sounds like you, then the following excerpt from a blog post called 'Worksheetcloud', written by a parent (who himself struggles with Afrikaans) for parents who find themselves in the same boat, may be useful.

He writes: 'Learners are supposed to have a big enough Afrikaans vocabulary to be able to write coherent sentences for their grade level. Additionally, many parents struggle to speak or understand Afrikaans, which in turn leads them to feel hopeless.' This sense of hopelessness usually carries over to the children and becomes a vicious cycle.

He continues: "The good news is that with a bit of effort, you CAN help your child improve their Afrikaans mark within the space of a few short months.' His advice is as follows:

1. Start with the INSTRUCTION words!

The biggest problem with any First Additional Language exam paper/homework, is that even if your child studied well for it, he or she **might not understand the instructions in the paper and therefore won't know how to an** swer the questions. The best way to help with this is to make your child study these instruction words beforehand.

Teachers generally don't trick learners with instructions; they are simply following the guidelines set for them in the CAPS document (which is freely available on the Department of Education's website). This means that you can also access these instruction words and teach it to your child.

I find it may be a good starting point to discuss with our CityKidz Afrikaans teachers about the instruction words that they may use for tasks/exams and homework to help your child.

Here are some examples of instruction words your child should know:

Verduidelik (Explain)

Kies die korrekte antwoord (Choose the correct answer)

Antwoord in 'n volsin (Answer using a full sentence)


Antwoord met een woord (Answer using one word) Waar of vals (True or false)

Gee 'n rede vir jou antwoord (Give a reason for your answer)

2. Use an official dictionary.

A reliable and current bilingual dictionary is a wise investment this father to a 14 year old continues. 'Your child will get much use out of

a good bilingual dictionary.' Although dictionaries are generally not permitted in exam situations, they can be used when doing writing or any other exercise in class or when preparing for tasks (like oral presentations) at home



Want to get your child to learn and remember words? Have them write it down.

A handy tip is to buy your child an A5-size notebook in which they can write any new Afrikaans words they learn throughout the year, along with the English translation, this dad concludes.

Although good, free Afrikaans resources are few and far between, there are some videos you can find on YouTube. Type into the search bar – Afrikaans for beginners and a few useful videos pop up. Some of my personal favourites are:

Kleure in Afrikaans – Lamie leer en speel videos

Die wiele op die bus – Zoemba the Rhino






Aftercare Fun Friday – 30 May 2025




