
the scenes every day.

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Life Orientation Project Grade 7's


The Grade 7s have been learning about the risk factors, forms and symptoms of substance abuse. We also identified some myths around the topic and debunked these myths. Such as, "alcohol is not a drug because it is legal, and marijuana is a plant so it cannot harm you". The aim going into this topic was not to merely focus on substance abuse and the dangers thereof, but to also stretch the learners' knowledge and expand it to the point of addiction. Substance abuse is regarded as the excessive use of chemical substances that a person

may require dependency thereof. This can lead to an array of repercussions such as, physical, social, psychological and emotional harm.

Addiction can take shape in many forms and people can be addicted to almost anything. Delving into this topic is interesting because it's an extension from two main topics we covered in Term 1 and 2, which are peer pressure and self-image. Substances can be classified into legal (alcohol, cigarettes and prescription or over-the-counter medicines), as well as illegal (inhalants, street drugs and injectables).

According to the South African Depression and Anxiety Group (SADAG), the substance that is abused commonly in South Africa is alcohol. SADAG reported the following, "the average age for drug dependency in South Africa is a staggering 12 years, with 50% of South African teens drinking alcohol". The aim of this term's project is to create awareness around the substance abuse and its dangers. I am thrilled with the work that the Grade 7s have produced so far. I look forward to listening to the presentation of their research.



1.British vs American Spelling:

Different Endings

British spelling prefers:

-re not -er (e.g., centre, not center)

–nce not **–nse** (e.g., *defence*, not *defense*)

-ise not -ize (e.g., organise, not organize)

-ou not -or (e.g., favour, not favor)

-yse not **-yze** (e.g., *analyse*, not *analyze*)

2.Double Vowels (Diphthongs)

British English often uses **ae** and **oe** in one-syllable vowel combinations:



Double "L" Rule

If a word ends in a vowel $+ \mathbf{l}$, double the \mathbf{l} when adding a suffix:

Great news ... it's a whole-school competition again!!! The Rhythm Robot All Class Challenge is aimed at taking something ordinary - paper, toilet rolls, milk bottles, straws, any recyclable materials and repurposing them to create a colourful, functional robot that has at least 2 movements.

This time, the competition is per class. (Non-Homeroom teachers, Admin and Maintenance will be allocated to assist a class.)

At CityKidz we want to encourage and showcase how robotics and recycling can inspire our learning and convey a powerful social message. Each class needs to create an awesome robot made from any recyclable materials that also has an inspirational message and/or quote.

In addition, the robot must be placed on board, a track or a stand that represents the world the robot comes from and/or lives in. This should be decorated, with a related robot/robotics theme.

The specifications for the robot are: minimum height: 30cm

must be able to move in two (2) ways

Each class will submit a single entry. The project will focus on teamwork, foster collaboration, research and cohesion. Over the next couple of weeks, you need to encourage learners to do research, make designs, collect materials! Encourage responsible sourcing, set up teams and organise task lists. Start sourcing glue, paint, varnish and other essentials, if needed.

How you, as a class, go about this, is entirely up to your class, but it is important to get your parents involved.

Remember, the robot will be showcased as one class entry with two items per class. It might seem easier this way, but the competition is going up a level. This year, 2025, CityKidz opened its AI centre. Like last year we will be inviting external judges for the competition to ensure impartiality and fairness. This adds to the excitement and allows for our CityKidz community to be involved.

The criteria on how CityKidz Rhythm Robot All Class Challenge 2025 will be judged are indicated on the next page. I have also included some photographs to inspire you in creating wonderful pieces. This challenge is a fantastic way to combine creativity, sustainability and practicality.

There will be prize money for the winning teachers and a prize for the winning class!! I'm sure you will all be brainstorming with great ideas and adding your own creative twist on how your class can create a lasting CityKidz Rhythm Robot All Class Challenge 2025. Remember, the possibilities are endless when it comes to submitting a fantastic entry. With a little imagination and effort, you can add character and sustainability to our school with your inspired robot designs. So, start drumming up some robot rhythms!




